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The McIntyre Family



Darren & Raeanne McIntyre were like most young couples wanting to expand their family. Their son Karter who was almost 5 years old at the time had longed for another sibling. There was only one set back between them and their dream infertility issues. Raeanne went to the doctor and was told she would not be able to conceive naturally due to a complete bilateral tubal blockage. In April 2016, Darren and Raeanne got the call from Aurora Fertility Clinic - soon to be the start of IVF (In Vitro Fertilization) journey. May 4th, 2016 was "retrieval day" and just over two weeks after the "transferring" of eggs the first positive pregnancy test came back!

Through the pregnancy many different complications arose – cholestasis, kidney stones, increased bile acid salts, and then the inevitable pre-eclampsia. After many hospitalizations and trips to Saskatoon the decision was finally made on November 15th, 2016 "to pull the plug". Kenlee Marie Dayle was delivered via emergency C-section at 8:27 pm weighing 2lbs 4.5oz.

She had "IUGR" (Inter uterine growth restriction) and a true knot in her cord. After spending 23 days in Regina, where Kenlee faced many obstacles, on December 10th our family was flown back to Saskatoon and settled into the RUH NICU & Ronald McDonald House.

I remember walking into the House and being so uneasy about leaving my little girl in the hospital and not being by her side. We walked up to our room on the 3rd floor and noticed a chalkboard message that said "Take a Deep Breath You're Home Now". I broke down and cried – the feeling of my family finally getting to be together.







The House was so accommodating and the staff & volunteers went above and beyond for us. It truly was our home away from home. As the days passed and Christmas was near I remember being upset that we wouldn't be home for the holidays. My son wrote a letter to Santa

and specifically told him "my sister is in the hospital and I really want her and mommy home for Christmas".

The House is very busy leading up to Christmas. One particular memory we recall was the night carolers, who wore Christmas lights, came to the House and sang. My son sang along with them as tears stormed down my face. Christmas at the House was something our family will never forget - extended family came up and spent the night at the Ronald McDonald House, Santa made a stop at the House for Karter and even though we were not back home in Battleford, we were still able to spend the holiday together.

On December 29th, 2016 our little fighter was discharged from the NICU and we were able to take her home. Kenlee was sent home on home oxygen for up to 7 months, which meant more check-up appointments and House stays, Karter was thrilled, he loved everything about the House, staff, volunteers and playrooms.

Fast forward to January 2018. Darren and I found out that we were expecting yet again. But this couldn't be true! We struggled with infertility for so long and after all of our complications with Kenlee (29 weeks premature) we had decided it wasn't safe to have any more children. We were told that we had less then 5-8% chance of ever conceiving naturally but there were other plans for our family and on January 20th, 2018 we found out that we had defied those odds. We went to our family doctor for an ultrasound and found out very early in the pregnancy we were having twins! Our little miracle babies!

As the pregnancy progressed, so did the appointments in Saskatoon, sometimes being there up to three times in one week. Then the complications started... cholestasis, increased bile acid salts, IUGR, gestational diabetes and increased blood pressure. Due to our risk factor and all the complications we told



Karter and Kenlee that their baby brother and sister would likely come early and would have to spend most of the summer in Saskatoon. Karter couldn't wait! With nearing the end of his school year in June of 2018, he would constantly ask us "When are we going to go to the Ronald McDonald House?", "Is it time yet?", "When can we go?". On July 5th, 2018 we went to the city for what we thought was going to be a routine ultrasound. During the ultrasound my heart sank and I could feel worry in the room - I could see that my little baby was not moving. The doctor came in and told us the words we did not want to hear: "We need to deliver today." I immediately began to cry, our worst nightmare was being relived but this time our babies were potentially smaller as well as only 28 weeks gestation.

I was immediately given steroids to help "mature" the twins' lungs and was moved to another room to be monitored closely before heading to the operating room for another emergency C-section. Darren started making some calls, one of which to the Ronald McDonald House to secure a room. With many emotions going through my head and fear of the unknown - RMHC-SK was the one place we could count on. 'Twin A' arrived at 5:00pm weighing 1lbs 6oz (Braxton William Robert McIntyre) and 'Twin B' arrived at 5:01pm

weighing 2lbs 6oz (Bryer Brea Ann McIntyre).

Our family was now complete - both babies were quickly whisked off to the NICU leading us back to our "home away from home". The staff awaited our arrival with wide open arms. We knew we were in for a long haul and walking into the house we knew we were "Home". Our journey had many ups and downs while we spent our days in the NICU, these little tiny miracles stayed resilient and overcame many obstacles.

During our 91 day stay at the Ronald McDonald House we have many fond memories. We celebrated Karter's 7th birthday, we met the Saskatchewan Rush Hulk and we celebrated the many milestones of our little ones. We also saw and felt the heartbreak as other House families lost their loved ones during their stay at the House. We were fortunate enough to have met many different families some of who have become very close friends. The staff was nothing short of amazing and made us feel so loved. Not one person goes unnoticed volunteers, front end staff. behind the scenes staff, house keepers and security guards all make this a Home. We leave the House with beautiful memories, love from strangers who became like family and a fond knowledge and

We believe that group volunteering is a win-win-win situation. The House wins by having others assist us in achieving our mission, the families win because we are able to enhance the experience they have with us, and the volunteer wins by gaining a sense of achievement and generosity with their friends, family or coworkers. We are so grateful to the following groups for helping us keep families together when they truly need it most.

Toy Team

This lovely group of volunteers makes play easy and accessible for the kids at the House. Over the four floors of Ronald McDonald House, we have a large collection of toys that

require cleaning, repair, replacement and organization. For example, some times the cars get separated from the race track and Barbie is left with only one outfit (if she's lucky!). This team comes in regularly to keep our toy collection and spaces clean, safe, organized and most importantly in the kid's opinion...fun! We strive to provide a sense of normalcy for the families that stay with us, and for children play should not only be normal, but vital!

Breakfast Team


Home for Dinner Host Team

The Tumambing Family

Our medical journey began March 2018 when Santino was born with breathing and colon issues. Seeing him with all the tubes and wires back at the NICU, we knew that our lives had been changed forever. At just one week old, he was diagnosed with Hirschrprungs Disease, an incurable condition that affects someone's ability to pass stool. He received his colostomy procedure that same week in the hopes that it would correct his bowel issues and also address the major problem - his breathing.

We still remember the look on the doctor's face when he told us Santino's colostomy was successful, but they were still uncertain why Santino could not breathe on his own. They did not want to give us a false diagnosis and assume the worst, but from the look on his face, we knew that something was still not right. Genetic testing was done to confirm the probable diagnosis, and in those three weeks. the results came back. Santino tested positive with Congenital Central Hypoventilation Syndrome - another rare genetic disorder of the central nervous system which is causing him to stop breathing when sleeping. The medical team was already discussing his transfer to a hospital

in Saskatoon, and immediately, our minds were bombarded with a million questions. Where do we go from here? Where are we going to stay? How are we going to make this work, being away from our home in Regina? Just when things seem so vague and hopeless, one of the social workers introduced us to the Ronald McDonald House in Saskatoon. We had always known about the charity whenever we went to a McDonald's

Restaurant, but it had never really registered what the charity truly meant to families until it happened to us.


At two months old, Santino went through three more procedures - Gastrostomy, pull through for his bowel, and tracheostomy for his breathing. Our son spent 138 days in the hospital, and we stayed 114 days at the Ronald McDonald House in Saskatoon, which has truly become our second home. In the midst of every improvement or setback, the House has always been there to support us. It is amazing how such a devastating

experience in the beginning turned into a positive one by staying at the House where everyone easily became our family. From the staff to the volunteers, evervone welcomed us with the warmest of smiles and hugs. The House allowed us to even connect with other families to share each other's experiences, and we still keep in touch to this day. We may be enjoying our home in Regina, but the Ronald McDonald House will always hold a special place in our hearts. We would not be where we are now if it was not for Ronald McDonald House Charities Saskatchewan.

The Slobodian Family

Mya was a normal kid, involved in school, dance and family activities. When we noticed that she was drinking an excessive amount of water, we decided to see the doctor in April of 2017. September of 2017, after months of appointments, we found out that Mya had been diagnosed with a brain tumour.

Even before Mya was diagnosed, we spent a night or 2 at the Ronald McDonald House for various appointments for her and her sister Blakeney. Back then, it was a nice place to stay for a night. while we had appointments in Saskatoon. For the first portion of Mya's treatment, we were able to stay close to home. In October of 2017, Mya began her chemotherapy treatments in Regina at the Allan Blair Cancer Centre. She had four rounds of chemo and was tolerating it the best she could. She was strong and positive throughout every poke, procedure and treatment. When it came time for the radiation portion of her treatment plan, we had to relocate ourselves to Saskatoon. We weighed all of our options heavily – thought about renting an apartment, staying in a hotel or imposing on friends and family. We chose to stay at the Ronald McDonald

House. This was one of the best choices we ever made and moved to the House in January of 2018, staying for 42 nights, while Mya received her 30 radiation treatments. We honestly don't know how we would have gotten through this phase without the support of the Ronald McDonald House. It is a place to laugh, cry and feel loved.

The Ronald McDonald House is a place like no other we have ever

experienced. From the moment you walk in the door, you feel the love. The love of the staff, the other families and most importantly is the love that grows between the kids. We have been fortunate and have made some amazing friends while we were at the house. These are bonds that will last a lifetime. They are treasured friends that truly understand what we are all going through. We celebrate the victories and the tragedies with each other and are there to support one another, long after we leave.

days before her diagnosis, she decided to go without birthday gifts. Instead, she asked for donations to the Ronald McDonald House. Her friends and family supported her idea and the donations started coming in. Once she was in active treatments, we put the fundraising on the back burner and as she started to fight the cancer. Once she was off treatments, she was all in and back into the fundraising. We have been lucky to have great support both personally and in our community. In July of 2018, Mya presented the House with a donation in the amount of \$3,270. Mya has inspired many people to join her cause; these include her elementary school. Redhead Equipment, Bella Chic and Craig Manufacturing. So far, Mya's team has raised over \$10,000! From the bottom of the Slobodian Family's heart we cannot thank Ronald McDonald House Charities Saskatchewan enough, helping keep our family close when we truly needed it most.

On the same day a car crash killed her mother, Aurora Skye was born in the world 3 months premature. She was just over 2 pounds and suffered a head injury in utero. It was on this same day that Josie Ledoux said goodbye to her youngest daughter and became the primary care

giver to her very first granddaughter, Aurora. Aurora came into the world with a lot of complications, but Josie and her family managed to be there with her every step of the way.

Four and a half years down the road of Aurora's journey things started to get complicated, ending up in the hospital nearly every week. With a good chunk of our hospital visits at the Victoria Hospital in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan this is where we found out about the Ronald McDonald Family Room. This room came in handy not only for me but for all the other families that were there for more than a night or two. It brought back a lot of memories of staying at the Ronald McDonald House in Saskatoon and how helpful and caring everybody was.


