Saskatchewan Families First: Tammy Forrester shares the mission of Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan

“I will work there one day. I don’t know what I’m going to do there, or in what capacity, but that is a place where I will find myself at some point in time.”

These are the words that Tammy Forrester said to her husband after a tour of The Ronald McDonald House in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, from the then Executive Director Sandee Day, nearly two decades before Forrester became CEO.

The House just has that kind of impact on a person and Forrester, being a proud Saskatchewanian with a family-first mindset, was blown away by this life-changing organization that shared her passion for serving families, and giving back to them at a time where families need support the most.

With the seed already planted in her mind, Forrester first tackled a few other career pursuits across Canada. However, one thing remained consistent - her love of Saskatchewan. So

Tammy and her husband set down their roots firmly to live and work and participate in the community within this province.

After working on her own career path and business for two decades, she began her journey in 2012 at Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan.

Over the last decade, Forrester and the team at Ronald McDonald House have created a beautiful garden space next to the House in Saskatoon and a Family Room in Prince Albert (opened in 2016). RMHC – SK had a voice at the global planning table for the worldwide organization. The highlight for Forrester and the RMHC – SK board and staff happened earlier in 2012 with the launch of the Capital Campaign. Its successful wrap-up in 2013 and the opening of the expanded facility for families in the fall of 2014.

Working for Ronald McDonald House has had a profound impact on Forrester. She takes immense pride in helping to lead an organization that enables families to make it through difficult times by offering them additional support along their stressful and uncertain journeys. Additional support that is crucial to the well-being of Saskatchewan families.

“Back in 2018, RBC conducted a National economic study on the financial impact on families that face uncertain medical outcomes of their child,” shares Forrester. “Results from this study found the financial implications on families that are dealing with these uncertain medical needs can be absolutely catastrophic in nature. When families find themselves in this place of uncertainty, there is the potential for parents to lose their jobs, or sacrifice their careers. Families may move from their homes for a time being, and may struggle to pay their bills. Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan supports these families in their situations by offering accommodations at \$10 a night, increasing support services during their stay, and providing basic necessities including regular food programs. All these services and programs are designed to take care of the whole family, their health and their well-being.



What's next for Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan?

“Serving more families,” says Forrester. “What does it look like to really support and serve all families in Saskatchewan, not just those traveling to Saskatoon, not just those who need day service in the Family Room, but others? We need to consider what the RMHC – SK outreach is and how we can continue to build, and expand and grow that support.”

Of course past and future expansions would not be possible without the funding support of our community. RMHC – SK’s founding and forever partner, McDonald’s provides a wonderful base of funding, which accounts for almost 25% of all funds annually, which is an amazing gift and partnership. That leaves 75% to be raised in the community every year.

“If you have a heart to support families across this province, this is a place that you can contribute where your support will go directly towards services and programs that will reach the families we serve every day,” says Forrester on the importance of donating. “You don’t know when all of a sudden this place is going to be required by someone you love, someone you know, someone you’re connected to. Medical emergencies and situations take us all by surprise, and no one ever expects their child to fall ill.

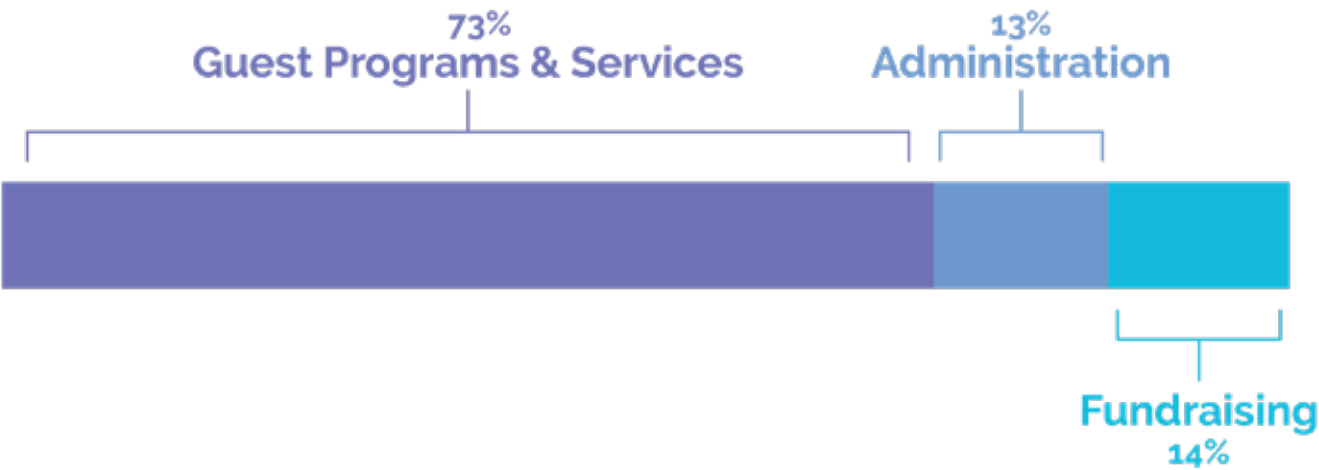

“There is a never ending source of love and kindness inside all of us, and each and every day we get to make the choice to serve each other with that love and kindness.”

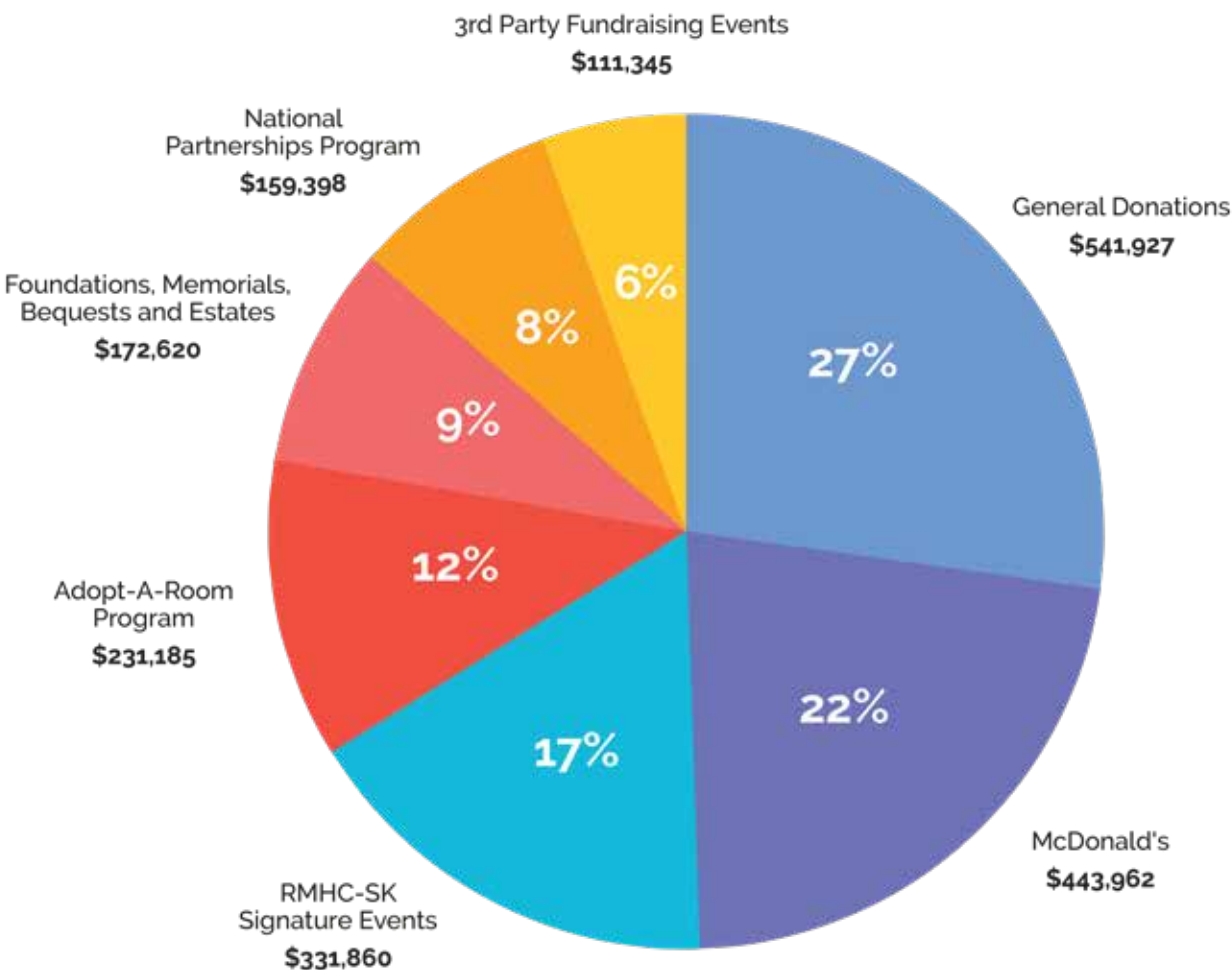

The Felix Family

On December 30, 2020 Meagan Ratt's water broke, approximately 24 weeks before her due date. She was immediately airlifted to Saskatoon from La Ronge and remained in labour for five days before having an emergency caesarean section.

"I was 4cm dilated for five days," recalls Meagan. "And on January 4, the doctors decided that it wasn't safe for my baby to be in my womb because we were both in danger of getting an infection. I was in complete disbelief. I didn't comprehend anything during those five days. It was so scary because she was so incredibly tiny."

Meleya was born to Meagan Ratt and Trevor Felix on January 4, 2020 weighing only 1 lb. 13 oz.



Premature babies require special medical care. Convenient hospital access is key to their health and well-being, and having a place to stay close to the hospital was essential for Meagan and Trevor.

Trevor first found out about the Ronald McDonald House when he was a child, after his brother got sick. Trevor and his family stayed at the House during that time, and had nothing but positive things to say about their experience. So it was an easy choice when deciding where to turn for support this time around.

"It was an easy process," remembers Meagan. "All we had to do was tell them where we wanted to go, and the nurse and social worker actually got it set up for us. I was still in the hospital at the time, but Trevor went and had the tour."

The family lived at the Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan for nearly eight months.

"It was like home," says Meagan. "We were able to cook our own meals and do anything we needed in the house."

In addition to the home-cooked meals, Meagan fondly remembers the connections she made with the Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan staff. "The staff is really amazing and they check on you frequently and ask how you and your baby are doing. They actually care about your family's well-being."

Meagan recalls the many times the staff at Ronald McDonald House remembered the little details or went the extra mile to brighten their day. "They remember things and know things," she says. "When it was one of our birthdays, they actually celebrated it with us and gave us gifts. Same with Mother's Day and Father's Day. They made us feel really special."

Since leaving the Ronald McDonald House, Meagan and Trevor are getting settled into their new routine at home.



"Meleya is a medically complex baby. We came home with 24/7 oxygen, a feeding tube, and several medications," says Meagan. However, the family is managing quite well. "We are currently isolating and will continue isolating until COVID rates go low. We just want to ensure we keep our baby safe. But we are doing great, Trevor and I are a complete dream team."

Meagan also recommends the Ronald McDonald House to everyone who is in need of family support. "Recently, I had a cousin that had a premature baby and I immediately suggested for her to go to Ronald McDonald House," she shares. "Being on that emotional roller coaster, Ronald McDonald House makes it easier to simply be with your baby."

Worrying about your child's health is exhausting, and that stress is only worsened when you're in an unfamiliar city, away from the comforts of home. Having a place that recreates the comfort and familiarity of home has an incredible impact on the Saskatchewan families that need it most.

"To the team at Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan we say, thank you so much! We're incredibly grateful for the RMH because we come from La Ronge and staying there made everything so much better. It truly felt like a home away from home."

PA Family Room

The year 2016 was a significant milestone for Ronald McDonald House Charities Saskatchewan. During this time, the organization went from being “the House in Saskatoon” to being a true provincial organization. By opening the doors of Saskatchewan’s first ever Family Room in Prince Albert, Ronald McDonald House expanded its reach into a new community.

The Family Room opened in the Prince Albert Victoria Hospital five years ago, on September 27, 2016. Since it’s opening, the impact of the Family Room has been profound.

In five short years, the expansion not only strengthened Ronald McDonald House’s relationship with the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA), but it also shifted public perception of RMHC-SK to being an integral part of Family Centered Care within our provincial healthcare system.

The Ronald McDonald Family Room has witnessed the small moments that are often overlooked in daily life, yet are so important to families of hospitalized kids. During the last five years, over 13,000 families from the Prince Albert area and Northern Communities have

found comfort in “normal, everyday things” at the Family Room such as laundry, fresh baking, new friendships, an opportunity to connect with other Pediatric families, and time to play and relax.

To families in need of support, the Family Room is many things. For single mom Kimberly, it’s a place of normalcy, taking a shower after a long and sleepless night caring for her premature baby. For little Lucas, it’s a place of joy, riding the bumblebee while being hooked up to an IV. For teen Emery, it’s a place of escape, getting out of the small inpatient room to visit with other family members. For the family who just lost their little one, it’s a place to quietly grieve.

There are so many other moments that will forever be engraved on the hearts of staff and volunteers. But despite all the circumstances, the Family Room remains a safe space just steps away from a child’s bed and the medical setting into a nurturing and home-like environment.

The Morrison Family

Carter Morrison was born on June 24, 2004 at the Regina General Hospital. His parents, Lisa and Trevor, were told just eight days before his birth that he had not fully developed and immediately following his birth he would be placed directly into the neonatal intensive care unit (N.I.C.U). This is where the Morrisons' story begins.

While Carter was in the N.I.C.U. fighting for his life, Lisa was released and told to go home. Unfortunately, home was over two hours away and the family felt overwhelmed and devastated at the thought of leaving their child alone. Trevor, Lisa, and their two other children, needed to be close to Carter.

A case worker found Lisa an empty bed so that she could stay with Carter. "I got to stay in a room for a week, and I remember coming home to our small town and talking to friends, saying how overwhelmed I was and how alone I felt," remembers Lisa. "I thought 'there's got to be something else out there'".

And there was. A friend of Lisa's told her about the Ronald McDonald House and suggested she give them a call.

At six weeks old, Carter was diagnosed with achondroplasia, a type of dwarfism that comes with further complications. Just before his first birthday, he once again was fighting for his life. The family was sent five hours away to Saskatoon, and with the Ronald McDonald House top of mind, they called the house and were welcomed right in.

Over the last 16 years, the family has stayed at Ronald McDonald Houses in Edmonton, Winnipeg, and Saskatoon.

The House gave the Morrisons what they needed most - their family. Lisa recalls their first visit to the House like it was yesterday. "I wasn't sure what to expect. I wasn't expecting someone to greet us at the door and give us a hug and offer us a meal and tell us there would be breakfast and hot coffee in the morning. You just walk in and feel at home."

Over the years, that sense of warmth and comfort has never wavered.

"We've been there long enough that some of the staff is retired," laughs Trevor. "The people that were there when we first stayed were awesome, and the people that have come in since then have carried on such a unique care factor and are so welcoming. They make it so easy for you."

Although Carter will continuously travel for medical treatment, Lisa believes the House and what it stands for is the reason her son is healthy, determined, loving and successful. He is currently in grade 12 and has a passion for golf.

"Competing at the World Dwarf Games in Guelph, Ontario was pretty cool," recalls Carter. "Recently, I was in Toronto competing in the Canadian All Abilities Championship for golf for the first time." In the near future, Carter hopes to participate in even more tournaments, as well as go to university.

As the need for the Ronald McDonald House continues to grow, Lisa emphasizes the need for more houses across Saskatchewan. "Regina definitely needs a Ronald McDonald House," she says. "Need is an understatement. A lot of families don't have the resources to get a hotel for weeks or months at a time in Regina or drive back and forth and leave their child behind. It's just too much."

"I'd call it a no brainer," agrees Trevor. "It's so hard to explain until you've been there. But it is definitely needed. Wherever you have these situations you need a support group, and the Ronald McDonald House is a huge support group."

Speaking to other families across the province, the Morrison family encourages people to reach out and give Ronald McDonald House a call.

"Sometimes you don't want to ask for help or you feel like you're always asking for help, and it's just one more thing that makes you think, 'no, we can do this on our own,'" says Lisa. "But don't. Go talk to them because it really does make everything better."





Superstar Volunteers



In a conversation with Kathy Boechler, Kathy has been a passionate supporter and volunteer for Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan since before it's opening in 1985.

"I started volunteering, doing fundraising for the House, about two years before it opened. I'm kind of the old girl there," laughs Boechler.

She's always had a passion for kids and community, but it was actually her high school job that started her on this journey.

"My high school job was actually at McDonald's in Saskatoon," shares Boechler. "I got to know Bill Mitchell, the owner operator, really well. He became involved in the initial groundwork of fundraising and starting the House, so I heard about it from him."

fashion show in the past. Currently Kathy and her team coordinate the seasonal decorating at the House. Boechler says that watching the families deal with what they're going through is both the hardest part, but also the most inspiring.





"I've had lots of experiences volunteering there and they've all been wonderful," she says. "It's really a place where so many good people come together that is very enriching and fulfilling."

The Ronald McDonald House would not be what it is without the help of so many dedicated volunteers that happily donate their time. Many volunteers have been doing it for nearly as long as Boechler, and they've made lasting connections along the way.

"I've been doing it since 1985, and the group I decorate with have been along for the ride," she says. "I've made many long lasting friendships, even after people have moved on or moved away or got involved in other things."

Boechler encourages others to get involved with the Ronald McDonald House in any way that they can. "It's a great organization to be part of. The rewards are endless and there's so many ways that you can give."

Over the last nearly 40 years, Boechler has watched the Ronald McDonald House grow and expand right before her eyes. She remembers walking through the doors of the expansion for the first time, as well as being there during the opening ceremonies.

"To have been there right from the groundwork and then to be able to watch the visionaries who decided that our province needed a place like that - It was pretty special to watch their dream become a reality. And I'm grateful that I was able to be a part of it."

4 Ways to Donate

Home for Dinner

The Home for Dinner program is a wonderful gift for families that stay at RMHC-SK. The Home for Dinner program provides a home cooked meal for families 3 evenings a week which gives comfort to the families during a very stressful time in their lives.

Currently the program team is requesting donations of catered meals from restaurants, gift cards and donations of food so the team can continue to support families when they need it the most.

Adopt-A-Room

The Adopt a Room Program allows an individual, a company or an organization to be the exclusive partner on one of the guest rooms at Ronald McDonald House Charities Saskatchewan. This contribution provides direct support for guest room upkeep and operations so families can have a place they call home while they are away from theirs.

The cost of adopting a room is \$10,000 a year for a minimum of three years and can be paid annually to support a family guest room or can be all at once. Donors receive three years of recognition with the option for renewal after 3-years.

Wish List

Donations of items from our Wishlist help RMHC-SK keep costs low so we can continue to provide a home like environment for the thousands of families that come through our doors. Items including gift cards for groceries, baking supplies, toiletries, crafts & recreation materials, and pick-me-up gifts, go a long way in helping to accommodate our families and make them feel at home.

Ronald McDonald House Charities Saskatchewan provides accommodation and support for families whose child is receiving essential medical treatment at a nearby medical facility in Saskatoon. The "Gift of Nights" program is a way to support families in the House and bridge the gap between the \$10/night contribution families are asked to make when they stay at the House and the actual cost of a night stay at the House being well over \$150/night.

Highlights of a New Food Program

Why did the Lunch Program start?

The Lunch Program began to serve families at the Jim Pattison Children's Hospital (JPCH) in Saskatoon during the beginning of COVID in April of 2020. During the early stages of the pandemic, a gap in food support to caregivers in the hospital was identified, and it was a service and program RMHC-SK was able to create and deliver on – it was something we could do to re-focus and put energy and effort in to support all Saskatchewan families. With the help of initial donors: PARR Autobody, Bart's Building Supplies and Federated CO-OP, RMHC-SK created a new lunch program that would provide meals for all families at JPCH in Saskatoon and grew into additional support in the Victoria Hospital in Prince Albert.

What is it?

Food Programs staff at RMHC-SK in the House and Family Room programs prepare and deliver lunches to all families at the JPCH and the Victoria Hospital. Deliveries are made in Saskatoon on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays and daily in Prince Albert.

How many lunches served?

Since the inception of the program in April of 2020, RMHC-SK has served 11,330 family lunches. This year alone 6,657 lunches have been prepared.

Who do we support?

Parents and caregivers at the JPCH in the Pediatric, Pediatric ICU, Neonatal ICU, Dubé Centre Youth program in Saskatoon and the Victoria Hospital - Pediatric department in Prince Albert.
