The REDI (Reconciliation, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion) vision is that individuals, organizations and other institutions make racial equity a day-to-day priority resulting in settings that are inclusive and safe.

## Our Commitment to REDI

In 2016, Ronald McDonald House Charities Saskatchewan embarked on a lifelong journey that has deeply impacted the work that the organization is doing. The REDI commitment focuses on prioritizing Reconciliation, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion in an ongoing effort to better serve the diverse families that call the Ronald McDonald House and the Ronald McDonald Family Room home.

"It started with walking into the dining room and seeing the diversity in the families that we serve and the people that were sitting around the dining room tables all eating together, having a meal, and sharing conversation," says Tammy Forrester, CEO of Ronald McDonald House Charities Saskatchewan. "It was that moment where I realized we needed to look at how we serve all families in our programs.""

The REDI journey began with a lot of learning, unlearning, mistakes, and opportunities to grow. There is no checklist for this type of work, and as the RMHC - SK team quickly learned, it is an ongoing commitment.

"Get to know where you are, whose land you're on, and who you serve," says Kelly Humphrey, Human Resources Assistant. "And know that it's going to be a long process, a forever process. It's not just long - it's forever."

The first step was for the team to learn how to navigate difficult conversations and help others understand why this work matters.

"We did it through emails, learning opportunities, sourcing BIPOC educators, and through videos and discussions,"

shares Kim Gilbert, Director of Human Resources. "We could change as many policies as we wanted, but unless we were changing people's hearts, we weren't going to get anywhere. We needed people to fully understand why we're doing this."

Walking into the House you can feel the effects of this work, even through the little things. Two LGBTQ+ safe space signs hang on the walls, employees and volunteers wear name tags with their preferred pronouns visible, sweetgrass hangs in the family services office, and smudge kits are readily available for families to use.

"We've sourced halal foods and vegetarian foods, so we can honour different people with different backgrounds," says Gilbert. "Even the way that we enter holiday seasons has shifted - it's not all about Christmas and Easter. We use these opportunities to have our staff learn about different ways in the world, but then our programming teams go out and deliver in a different way."

The team has also fostered a special relationship with Lyndon J. Linklater, who serves as the House's Knowledge Keeper. "It's important for us to express our gratitude to Lyndon," says Humphrey. "He's very generous with his wisdom and with his patience."

Over the last six years, the initiative has grown. From the board table, to volunteer orientation, to staff recruitment, it's become embedded within every area of the organization - even extending beyond the walls of the House.

"It's our job to fully engage in this work to truly support all families we serve," says Forrester. "This is a journey we are on together and we encourage all staff and volunteers to join us.""

When asked why this work is so important to the Ronald McDonald House, Forrester, Gilbert, and Humphrey answer in unison, "Families". It's all about families.

"That is the number one reason," says Forrester. "Families have to feel like this is home or as close to home as possible. A place of comfort, safety, where they can just be who they are. And the stress of all the other stuff going on inside of their head and their heart can relax in this place that they call home. So if we've created a space like that for all the people we serve, then I feel like we are doing the work we have been called to do."






# The Seabrook Family

#### 73 nights Turtleford, SK

Throughout April, May, and June of 2021, Autumn and Konrad Seabrook stayed at the Ronald McDonald House Charities Saskatchewan House while their daughter Isla was in the hospital with a rare genetic condition called Smith Lemli Opitz Syndrome. The family stayed for a total of 73 nights.

"When you go up the elevator, you see dozens of pictures of little kids and families that have stayed there," remembers Konrad. "When we got to our room, there was a sign that said "Welcome Seabrook Family", and that's when we knew this was so much more than just somewhere to sleep or somewhere to put your stuff. This was somewhere you felt like you belonged."

The Seabrooks stayed with their two other children; Myles, 5 and Emma, 3. Autumn recalls the staff being so quick to find activities for the kids, grabbing toys for them, and always making sure that they were stocked up with cookies and muffins.

"The best part is that we could come here at the end of every day," shares Autumn. "We didn't have to worry about cooking or cleaning for ourselves. There was just this sense of, 'We've got you covered. You can relax here, this is home."

When they first arrived it became instantly clear that this was the furthest thing from a hotel stay.

"We're really thankful that they weren't full when we needed a room," says Autumn. "It's a very necessary place. Had they not been there, I can't imagine having to stay in a hotel for two months, we would have felt so alone. And I think that's what really made the difference - we weren't alone in this."


Sadly, Isla passed away in April 2022, just after her first birthday. The family remains grateful for the moments they spent together at the House and all that it gave them.

"You're almost sad to go," says Autumn. "You're sad to leave that place because you have all those people caring for you and when you get home, you don't. You don't have people cooking and cleaning for you, and asking how you're doing all the time. It's not a place you want to have to stay, but we're sure thankful that it's a place we could stay."

The Seabrooks' advice to other families that find themselves in a similar situation is to take full advantage of all the things that the Ronald McDonald House offers.

"They'll bring you food to the hospital," shares Konrad. "Take advantage of those things. When you're in that situation, you just want to control everything because it's all up in the air. So I would say, lean on those people, because they're wonderful."

The Ronald McDonald House is a crucial support service for families in our province, and without volunteers and donors, it would not be possible to provide or expand this life-changing support.

# The Impact of Volunteering

Deanne Praski has worked with Ronald McDonald House Charities Saskatchewan for seven years. Starting as a volunteer and now as the organization's Volunteer Coordinator, a role she has held for five years, she has the benefit of understanding her work from both perspectives. In this role she oversees over 225 volunteers who generously give their time to helping the House and Family Room feel like home for the families that come through their doors.

"Our mission is that we will provide programs for families with sick children that positively impact the health and wellbeing of the entire family" says Praski. "Volunteers are vital in all of that. We know they're committed to us and we're committed to them." Thorough conversation and thoughtfulness goes into ensuring that



volunteers are placed in roles that both serve the mission and fulfill the individual who is giving of their time and energy.

# Volunteers are crucial to the success of the House and the Family Room, and contribute to the mission in many ways.

Praski notes that every little detail has an impact on the families – from kitchen clean up to seasonal decorators, and everything in between. "Sometimes the impact is not obvious, but it is always with the family's wellbeing in mind. An example is our outdoor garden space, when it looks the way it does, because volunteers have cared for it, families are able to go sit out there, have their coffee, and take a breath - that's impactful."

Volunteering is very rewarding. It can be emotional to see a family struggling or going through a difficult time, but the volunteers do it with empathy and understanding and are able to see the mission come to life before their very eyes.

"I would like to thank our volunteers for all the work they give, their dedication, and their time," says Praski. "It's immeasurable sometimes, and we want to make sure that we thank them and that they know the work they're doing matters."

# Family Programming

Ronald McDonald House Charities Saskatchewan is all about families. As the Family Service and Programs Manager, Dorianne Geske gets to build relationships and connect with families from all around the province - a job she exudes much passion and enthusiasm for.

"I love all things kids and family related, so I will very quickly make friends with all the littles in the house," shares Geske. "Some kids will say, 'Oh, Auntie Dory, how are you?' and that's the best thing in the whole wide world. That's where I love to work - building those relationships and figuring out what people actually need from us while they're here."



Relationships are key to the growth and success of the House, as family feedback influences how the House will expand.



Family Service is an important part of the Ronald McDonald House experience. From the very first connection, to support during their stay, to follow-up after they go home, this role touches every part of a family's journey with the House.

"We want to build relationships with families that are transparent and supportive so that they feel confident in giving us the good, the bad, and the ugly," says Geske, "Not just the thankful feedback at the very end of their stay."

By offering family-focused programs, families have an opportunity to connect with one another, and enjoy time together as a family unit. Programs like Pet Therapy, Expressive Art, KidsCare, caregiver support sessions, and various food programs really keep the family together, and connecting with one another in what might be a difficult time.





# The Joseph Family 198 nights (& counting) Prince Albert

Danelle Joseph and Lance Booker were first introduced to the Ronald McDonald House in 2019. The family needed a place to stay when their two twin boys, Asher and Milo, were in need of critical care.

In 2020, Milo sadly passed away at just six months old. His brother Asher currently stays in the House and has been there for 198 nights and counting.

"We were in the hospital for a good month, from ICU to pediatric unit, before we came to the Ronald McDonald House," shares Lance. "One thing I remember and will never forget is being

down in the playroom with Asher. I was moping around, kind of depressed and stressed, and I had lost track of reality. I looked down at Asher and he was riding a tricycle in the playroom, and that was the first time he'd ridden a tricycle. I just thought to myself, there's absolutely no reason why I should be feeling down, because he's overcome a lot of challenges so far. At that moment it kind of snapped some sense into me. I know you'll have your moments, but it was definitely a big turning point. The whole atmosphere at that moment will be something I'll never forget."

It's moments like these that the Ronald McDonald House is able to give to Saskatchewan families undergoing critical medical care.

Danelle also recalls a special memory at the House.

"It was at the end of March when all of my boys were finally together. Before that Asher wasn't really eating. You could tell he wasn't feeling it; it's like he knew he was out of place. But then my boys came, and the first time they saw each other they all started jumping around and smiling. Then just the next day, Asher started eating a lot. He was drinking, eating, and running around, and he was happy with his brothers."

Being surrounded by family makes all the difference when a person is healing - which is why the Ronald McDonald House is so important to our communities. Keeping families together is at the core of what they do, allowing kids the time and space to keep being kids, and ensuring parents don't miss out on those special little moments.

As Lance says, "It's the closest place to home you'll ever get."




# Thank you, Campbell Family

# **Prince Albert Family Room**

The PA Family Room opened on September 27, 2016, and provides 1,200 sq. feet of "home-like" living space for families who have a sick child in the hospital.



Located on the Pediatric floor of the Victoria Hospital, the room provides families with access to a computer and desk, kitchenette, bathroom and shower facilities, living room with TV and fireplace, three napping nooks, laundry facility, and complimentary snacks and beverages.

Since opening, the Family Room has supported more than 3,000 families, with more than 38,700 visits from Prince Albert and northern Saskatchewan communities. As an extension of the Ronald McDonald Family Room, in September 2022 we were proud to launch two unique and first-of-its-kind programs in Saskatchewan - the NICU Food Program and the Hospitality Cart.

Seven days a week, 24 hours a day, RMHC-SK provides nutritious food, beverages, and snacks for all families admitted to the new Malhotra NICU. In addition, our travelling Hospitality Cart visits once per week delivering lunches, comfort items, and the support that RMHC-SK is known for.

Food and meals provided by RMHC-SK play a huge role in reducing family stress, easing financial burden and, more importantly, providing strength and energy to care for families and their sick children. We're thrilled to expand this support to even more Saskatchewan families.
